It is my honor and privilege to welcome our honored guests, family members, and my brothers and sisters in Law Enforcement to this, the 28<sup>th</sup> Annual National Peace Officers' Memorial Service. My name is Chuck Canterbury I am President of the National Fraternal Order of Police.

On October 1<sup>st</sup> 1962 President John F. Kennedy signed a joint resolution offered by Congress that established May 15<sup>th</sup> of every year as Police Officers Memorial Day. This resolution formalized and provided a date for the law enforcement family in our Nation to do what we have always done and that is to honor those among our ranks who have paid the ultimate sacrifice.

Our recognition of fellow officers is filled with ritual, tradition and heartfelt appreciation and gratitude for their sacrifices.

"Let us resolve to do all in our power as citizens of these United States to support our Law enforcement officers in their work and pray that no more of them are taken from their families and those they so ably serve. In this way, those who have laid down their lives for their fellow man will not have died in vain."

It is obviously our hope that one day there will be no need to honor current year law enforcement officers but I can assure you that if such a year was to pass, we would still stand proud on May 15<sup>th</sup> to honor the thousands that have defended this great country, and we will always remember their dedication to duty.
